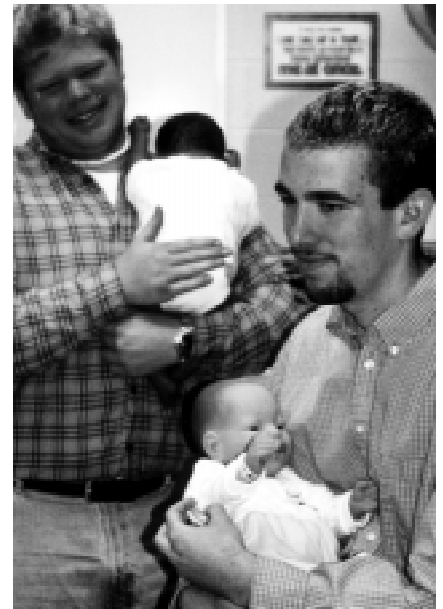
**Computerized Babies Teach Parenting Skills**

Students in Christine Stutzman's Family Life class no longer simulate parenting by carrying raw eggs with them—drop a “baby” and get a new one after a quick clean up—but with two computerized life-size babies that let the instructor evaluate care given.

Based on actual parenting logs, Stutzman programs a baby with its own temperament and unpredictable schedule of feedings, diaper changes, and need for comfort.

An array of computer chips and sensors embedded in diapers, bottles, and throughout the baby's body record the amount of time spent with the

But the impact goes both ways. Since boarding students come from various cultures, both students and hosts learn new ways of doing things. Incorporating persons with different cultural values, beliefs, and lifestyles into a family means adjustments for all—boarding students and host parents and their children.

Merv and Kathy's son Anthony ('97) notes, "You have to share your parents, but this helped me learn to deal with my own needs in other ways." Brother Ryan ('95) concurs and adds, "I have developed relationships that will last a lifetime; I consider each one as if they were my brother or sister."

While families typically choose to host students similar in age to their own children, others have not done so. Jim and Kathy Holsopple of New Paris chose to host before their own children were in school and found that their children enjoyed having older playmates. Ron and Betty Lou Collins of Goshen chose to host after several of their own children had graduated from high school and enjoyed the zest the youth added to the family.

While some situations don't work out, many hosts echo Kathy's feelings that the "benefits outweigh the frustrations."

Delvon ('66) and Shirley (Sawatzky, N'65) Yoder of Goshen, not only shared their faith with Ulrike Voigt (see p. 3), but celebrated her decision to become a Christian.

One student who lived with Eva (Hoover, '59) and Basil Borntrager of Goshen was pregnant when she came to Bethany as a frosh and chose to give up her child for adoption. After her graduation from Bethany, Eva and Basil continued to relate to her through the pain of a disastrous first marriage and the joys of a successful second marriage with three children. They recently joined her for a reunion with the daughter she gave up for adoption 19 years ago. "She is still part of the family," says Eva.

In fact for many hosts the most significant benefit is the long-term family relationships that develop.

James and Barbara Miller hosted three students in the 1970s, including Ed Mendoza (see p. 3), and are now "Grandpa and Grandma" to their children.

In the Fike household I saw a family who loved God and each other and lived to show that love to everyone they encountered. I saw for the first time how God intended a family to function, and I was a part of it. They did not only host me, they loved me. They invested time in me and prayed for me.

Over the years I have maintained contact with the Fikes. Ours was a divine connection and I am eternally grateful for their presence in my life.

baby, the number of times fed, burped, rocked, diapered, neglected, or put to sleep on its side or stomach which heightens the risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

The purpose of the assignment is for students to understand that the demands of infants are unpredictable but must be met promptly, that infants require a great deal of time and attention, and that the responsibilities of parenting changes lifestyle profoundly.

After caring for a baby over an extended weekend, senior Gretchen Miller noted that her moral decision to not have sex before marriage was reinforced and that even after marriage she would wait to have a baby.

Students needed to care for their baby wherever they went—ballgames, church, stores. Many people inquired about the assignment. One teenage clerk, a single mother exhausted from working and parenting, said, "I wish I would have had that opportunity in school—it would have made a difference for me."



Ron Kolb-Wyckoff received Bethany's 1999-2000 teacher-of-the-year award. Ron has taught grade 7 and 8 math since the inception of the middle school in 1996. He introduced a connected math program, a problem-based curriculum for grades 6-8. He has also been a leader in the development and use of rubrics for student assessment.

## Parent-Principal Forums

In a renewed effort to strengthen dialogue between school and home, Bethany held two forums this year.

Actions taken to address issues raised include written school-home communication guidelines, adding a spring parent-teacher conference, posting grades every 2-3 weeks, assignments given both in written and oral form, and planning socials for grades 6-9 prior to the start of school to assist in the social integration of incoming and returning students.

## Helmuth Resigns as Assistant Principal

After five years as a Spanish teacher and two as assistant principal, Ray G. Helmuth ('80) has resigned to become principal at Westview Elementary School in Emma, Ind.

"It has been a privilege to serve the Bethany community and I will continue to be a Bruin fan," says Ray. "I look forward to my children attending school here, as I did myself 20 years ago."

## Bethany Purchases Historic Violett House

In April Bethany Christian Schools purchased the William Violett House and property which borders the south side of the school's driveway.

The house dates back to 1854 and as a condition of purchase Bethany must maintain the house on the national registry of historic properties for at least 15 years.

Since the historic properties' designation requires only that the exterior of the house be maintained in its present appearance, the purchase of the land adds flexibility in developing a campus master plan in preparation for adding new facilities.

At present the Community Church of Waterford, which worships at Bethany, plans to rent the house for use as its church office.

The property is a capital asset and the purchase will not affect tuition or the operational budget since rental revenue should cover financing costs.

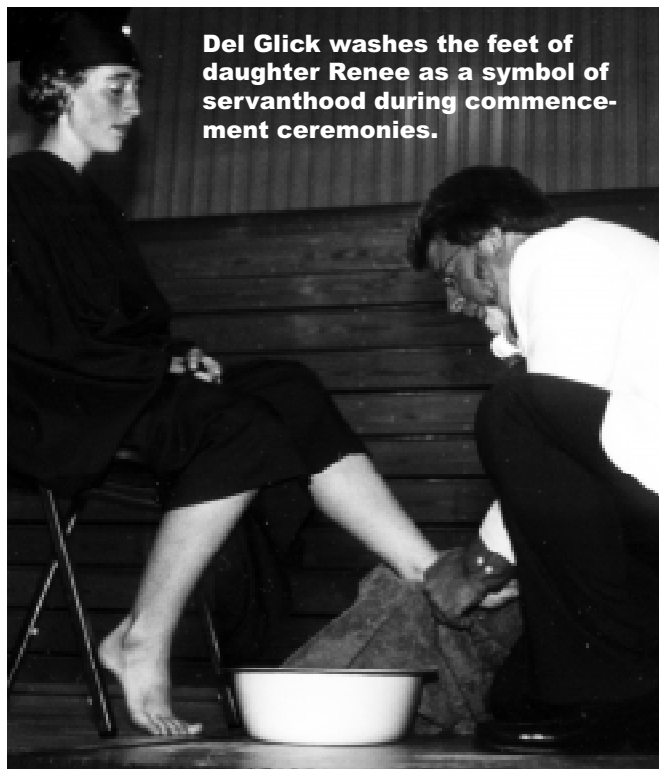
## New Board Member

## Disney Movie Portrays Myron Yoder ('73) Family

"Miracle in Lane 2," a Disney channel movie which premiered in May, portrays a story based on factual experiences of Myron ('73) and Sheila Yoder and their sons Justin and Seth ('01) of Middlebury, Ind.

One of the conditions the Yoders set before agreeing to this project was that faith be a part of their story. While local writers Joel Kauffmann and Don Yost use creative license to increase the suspense and heighten the humor, the basic story line is true.

Justin, the main subject of the movie, was born with spina bifida, which caused waist-down paralysis, and uses a wheelchair for mobility. He envies brother Seth's athletic trophies and his determination to get one of his own leads him to soap box derby racing.

Seth shared in chapel that, while he is sometimes uncomfortable having his life—good and bad—bared in public, he has also been able to step back and look at himself and say, "yeah, I am like that."

## Beachy Creates Disease-Resistant Tomato

Roger Beachy ('62) was named 1999 Scientist of the Year by *Research and Development Magazine* for his role in producing the first genetically-altered tomato resistant to virus and disease.

As a professor at Washington University in St. Louis, Beachy began experimenting with cross-protection, a technique of infecting plants with mild strains of viruses to prevent more virulent strains.

He also helped establish the International Laboratory for Tropical Agricultural Biotechnology to assist developing countries in the use of this technique and other modern technologies.

Currently, Beachy is president of the Donald Danforth Plant Science Center, established to be the premier research center for biotechnology and plant science research.

Beachy has also been involved in research on gene regulation and the development of vaccines in plants.

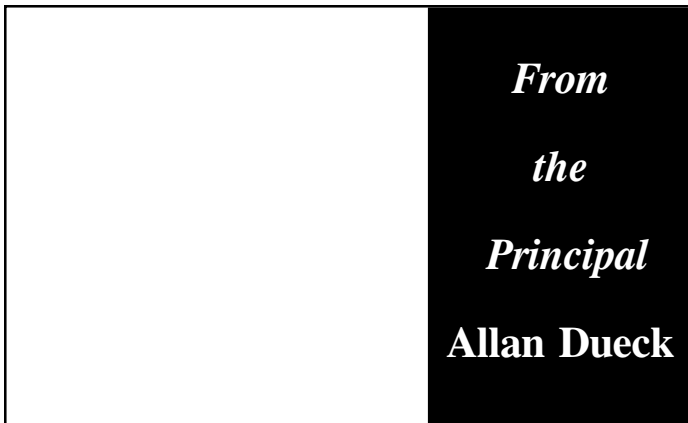

Recently, I enjoyed a surprise that adds zest to an administrator's life. Marion Bontrager, a friend and former colleague at Hesston College, dropped by for a chat. While at Hesston I had no idea that Marion had been a Bethany alumnus. However, since my coming to Bethany our paths have crossed several times, and I now know that he was a member of the first BCHS graduating class (1955).

During this recent visit Marion reminisced about superintendent John Steiner's impact on him. Having planned to attend Millersburg High for

his senior year, Marion says Steiner often encouraged him to attend Bethany. Just a few days before school, after the superintendent had visited him at his home, Marion decide to enroll. Beginning with that contact, and throughout the school year, Steiner became a towering influence in his life—giving him the "blessing" that has nourished him throughout his life.

This anecdote brings me to an exciting new project now unfolding. With Bethany's fiftieth anniversary fast approaching, the History Book Committee has begun planning a book to

commemorate the anniversary. During our meetings, a host of stories—some prosaic and many fascinating—have emerged.

We hope the book will identify and clarify broad themes and issues during the school's five decades. Within those themes, vignettes and anecdotes—such as the story of John Steiner's impact on Marion Bontrager—will provide the human, personal stories that are the school's soul.

Telling a story that involves as many people and perspectives as the history of an institution over fifty years is not easy.
